



#### WEST CHESTER KICK-OFF AND TOUR

The West Chester tours begin and end with refreshments at the Chester County Historical Society (CCHS) located at the northeast corner of High and Chestnut Streets. The season's opening ceremony is at 6:00 pm; tours begin at 6:30 p.m. The CCHS building is itself historical; its museum having been designed by Thomas U. Walter in 1848. From here, the tour guides will fan out into the NW sector of the Borough. The handsome streets of the district are lined with fine buildings in a panoply of historical styles, buildings which are often reminiscent with histories of their own.

GREAT VALLEY
PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Founded prior to 1710, Great Valley Presbyterian is the second oldest Presbyterian church in Pennsylvania. In 2010, its 300th anniversary will be celebrated. The first minister was a close friend of Benjamin Franklin. Tour the historic chapel, the oldest section of the church. Hear about life in the Great Valley during the colonial period circa 1724, and the role the church played during the American Revolution. Enjoy a tour of the cemetery, which includes Revolutionary Soldiers and other notable Chester County residents.

#### PAOLI MASSACRE & BATTLEFIELD

Come to the site of the Revolutionary War's Paoli Massacre; where the best of the British troops staged a midnight raid on General "Mad Anthony" Wayne's Pennsylvania Line, the best of the Continentals. Tales of the brutality of the British, who fought with bayonets and swords, gave rise to the nation's first war cry, "Remember Paoli". Interpreters, in period clothing, will talk about the battle. A special feature will display archeological techniques being used to uncover new knowledge about this important battle.

#### THORNDALE VILLAGE

Did you know ten thousand chickens once lived in Caln Township? Travel through the history of Thorndale Village, the heart of Caln Township. Quakers fleeing England for religious freedom found a valley in Chester County to make their new home. Members of the Thorndale United Methodist Church marched down Lincoln Highway carrying chairs and singing "Onward Christian Soldiers." During World War I, soldiers moved in to protect the railroad. The tour begins at the Thorndale Church and visits Caln Elementary School, the Pim-Uhler estate, and the hexagonal schoolhouse. The fire company will showcase old and new equipment and their stations.

#### KIMBERTON VILLAGE'S 18TH CENTURY QUAKER BURIAL GROUND

Established in 1758 by the first Quaker settlers of the area, the old burial yard south of Kimberton was long neglected until rescued by the Pikeland Historical Society in 1977. Notable families buried here include Lewis, Fussell, Meredith, Maris and Milhaus. These families and others were active in assisting refugees from slavery, in founding the Woman's Hospital in Philadelphia, and the Women's Suffrage Movement. Ancestors of Richard Milhaus Nixon worshipped in the Meeting House.

#### HISTORIC KENNETT BOROUGH

Goshenville was founded in 1704. Join us to hear first-person interpretation of life in this National Register District. Retaining its functioning forge, the William Sharpless Blacksmith and Wheelwright Shop was built in two sections (1704 and 1740). The Jesse Reece House (1800), now a B&B, was the first Post Office and General Store. The Historic American Building Survey lists the Milltown-Hickman Plank House (1808), which is a "Hall and Parlor House" filled with period pieces. Other buildings in the Historic District as well as the Wetlands Boardwalk will be included.

#### PHOENIXVILLE'S HISTORIC NORTHSIDE CHURCHES

In the 19th and early 20th centuries, immigrants came from all over Europe to work at the iron company and other industries in and around Phoenixville. Starting from the Schuylkill River Heritage Center (2 N Main Street), visit the historic churches to learn about these religious structures and their cultural connections to the hard-working people who built them.

The Romansville Methodist Church, said to have been the first land in Chester County owned by the Methodist faith and Romansville Quaker Meeting, turns 160 years old this year.

# THE MATHER MANSION & GROUNDS AT RADLEY RUN

Tour Samuel Painter's 1770 Mansion House and Barn (the clubhouse) on the sprawling grounds of Radley Run Country Club, which was part of the 1777 Battle of the Brandywine. Stroll the grounds visiting the 1749 Doll House, the Lye House ruins, and the Kennels and Huntsman's House. Learn about these significant components of the property's early 20th century transformation from a working dairy farm to a county estate, which headquartered the county's most prestigious fox hunt. Light refreshments will be served and an optional dinner offered.
